MS 2142 Papers of Avtar Jouhl and the Indian Workers Association, 1956-2005

Administrative History

Avtar Singh Jouhl was born in on 2 November 1937 in Doaba in the district of Jalandhar in Punjab, India where his parents had a farm. After school, he attended Khalsa college in Jalandhar and studied for a degree in Political Science. He came to Britain in 1957 and intended to study at the London School of Economics. He went to live with his brother in Smethwick, who had come to Britain a few years earlier, sharing a house with other men from his area who worked in foundries in Smethwick, Oldbury and West Bromwich. Although he intended to begin his studies, his brother and father-in-law found him a job at the Shotton Brothers foundry in Oldbury as a moulder's mate.

Avtar Jouhl and some other Indian workers organised a union at Shotton Brothers shortly after he began work there and managed to recruit a large number of employees. He was also involved in the formation of the Indian Workers Association in Birmingham with Jagmohan Joshi in the late 1950s and became secretary of the Birmingham branch of the organisation in 1959. He served as General Secretary of the national organisation from 1961-1964, was national organiser during the later 1960s, editor of 'Lalkar', the Indian Workers Association publication between 1967 and 1968, and served again as General Secretary after Jagmohan Joshi's death in 1979 until the mid 1990s. Throughout this period he took a prominent role in political campaigns and welfare activities organised by the Association and shaped its policy and programme. For a full history of the Indian Workers Association, see the catalogue for MS 2141: Papers of the Indian Workers Association.

Avtar Jouhl decided not to abandon his trade union activities or his post in the Indian Workers Association to attend university, and continued to work at the foundry. He was dismissed from Shotton Brothers in 1961, allegedly for making faulty castings, but his employers were likely to have been nervous about his union activities. He was employed in other foundries in the Smethwick area throughout the 1960s and 1970s except for a period in 1967-1968 when he was editor of 'Lalkar', the newspaper of the Indian Workers Association, and was based in London. He worked at Dartmouth Auto Castings during the 1960s, and was shop steward there for the Transport and General Workers Union [TGWU], which he had joined in 1968. He played an active role in this union, and was selected as a co-opted member for the enquiry team for the regional committee enquiry into the dispute at Imperial Typewriter in Leicester.

Avtar Jouhl became shop steward at Midland Motor Cylinder Company and Birmingham Aluminium Casting, but after returning from a visit to India, he worked again at Dartmouth Auto Castings through the 1970s and 1980s, by then part of Birmid Qualcast, as shop steward, senior shop steward and spokesperson for the company's shop steward committee.

Through educational training received at TGWU summer schools, Avtar Jouhl was able to take up a post as lecturer in Trade Union studies at Hall Green Technical College [later South Birmingham College] in 1987, where he taught until the mid 1990s. He continued to be a member of the TGWU but also joined the National Association of Teachers in Further and Higher Education [NATFHE], as a condition of his employment. He was elected as a member of the National Executive Committee, worked on the Equal Opportunities Committee of the union in the 1990s and was also a member of the Trades Union Congress [TUC] Race

Relations Committee, campaigning for greater representation of black people in further education and for equality of opportunity for all. He ran training courses and workshops, and spoke at conferences relating to trade union education, health and safety issues, and the need to tackle racism and discrimination both in the trade union movement and in wider society. He studied for a Certificate in Education at Matthew Boulton College/University of Warwick during the early 1990s, and was a visiting research fellow at the Centre for Research in Ethnic Relations at the University of Warwick in 1993. He retired from his lecturing post in the late 1990s but continues to take an active interest in the trade union movement.

Throughout Avtar Jouhl's working life, and beyond he has had a keen commitment to social justice, and has taken a leading role in political and social campaigns, particularly through the Indian Workers Association from the late 1950s onwards, but he has also worked with other anti-racist and progressive organisations, including the Campaign Against Racist Laws [CARL], Campaign Against Racism and Fascism [CARF], and the Anti-Nazi League, as committee member and officer. The Indian Workers Association allied with many of these groups for joint campaigns during the period when Avtar Jouhl was General Secretary from 1979.

Avtar Jouhl was interviewed by Charles Parker in the 1970s for what became the Banner Theatre show 'The Great Divide' which looked at experiences of racism faced by Asian workers in the Midlands. He also recorded an extensive interview for the Birmingham Black Oral History Project in 1990, in which he discussed his life and career. A transcript of this interview is held in the collection, and contains further biographical information, MS 2142/A/3/5.

This system of arrangement is loosely based on the scheme of arrangement and classification of organisational records developed by the Modern Records Centre, University of Warwick. Original order has been preserved where possible, and some of the file names are those given by the creators. For other material in the collection, papers have had to be sorted and an arrangement imposed. As a result, overlaps occur extensively within the collection, where related material appears in different sections of the catalogue. Cross references indicate obvious instances.

Description

Papers kept by Avtar Jouhl documenting his involvement in political campaigning organisations, primarily the Indian Workers Association (GB), and in the Trade Union movement. Papers of the Indian Workers Association (GB) largely cover the period from the late 1970s until the early 21st century, and comprise papers of the central organisation and of some local branches, including the Birmingham, later Birmingham and Sandwell branch. Papers consist of minutes; agendas; reports; constitutions; circulars; press statements; financial papers; correspondence; campaign and casework material; publications; membership records; press cuttings; photographs; and printed ephemera. The collection also includes papers of the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Centre, set up by the Indian Workers Association and includes substantial photocopies of British government files on the Indian political activist Udham Singh who was executed for the killing of Sir Michael O'Dwyer in 1940, generated for a research project run by the Indian Workers Association in the 1990s.

Other material in the collection consists of organisational and campaign papers of other groups connected with the Indian Workers Association through joint campaign work, or with Avtar Jouhl, and include minutes; agendas; circular letters; correspondence; press statements; flyers; and typescript and printed articles. There are also a number of photographs depicting some of the campaigning and trade union related activities that Avtar Jouhl was involved in during the 1980s.

Apart from the papers of the Indian Workers Association, the other main focus of this collection relates to Avtar Jouhl's career in the Trade Union movement and to two main activities; one as shop steward for the Transport and General Workers Union [TGWU] at Dartmouth Auto Castings and other foundries in the Birmid Industries group in the Smethwick area of the West Midlands during the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s; the other as lecturer in Trade Union Studies at Hall Green Technical College in Birmingham. Accordingly, the collection contains substantial shop stewards papers including minutes; agendas; correspondence; statements by company management; wage agreements and other associated material; and papers relating to health and safety at work and to industrial disputes. The bulk of the papers relating to Avtar Jouhl's trade union activities, however, focus on his role in Trade Union education, and include Trades Union Congress [TUC] Education Service publications and course materials; conference papers; and minutes and other organisational papers of a number of trade union committees of which he was a member, including the TUC Race Relations Committee and National Association for Teachers in Further and Higher Education [NATFHE] committees, as well as other trade union-linked bodies with which he was involved in an advisory capacity.

MS 2142/A Papers relating to Indian Workers Association activities and other campaigns, 1956-2005

This section documents Avtar Jouhl's political life largely separate from his trade union role. The most significant area is the records of the Indian Workers Association which make up the bulk of this section. But there are also papers relating to other campaigns which Avtar Jouhl was involved with, mainly during the 1980s and early 1990s, and his writings, and photographs. Full description of the scope and content of the Indian Workers Association records in this collection is provided in the description at MS 2142/A/1.

The other campaign papers in this section are characterised by their lack of explicit or direct association with the Indian Workers Association, or by their connection with both Indian Workers Association and trade union concerns, representing Avtar Jouhl's involvement in a variety of bodies and organisations working for social justice.

The subject matter of the majority of the writings in the section focus on campaigns against racism, or on Communist politics; while the photographs depict some of the trade union work and activist campaigns Avtar Jouhl took part in, and include photographs of the official opening of the Birmingham Trade Union Studies Centre.

MS 2142/A/1 Records of the Indian Workers Association, 1956-2005

Organisational records of the Indian Workers Association and papers relating to several local branches, including some organisational records of the Birmingham branch of the Association. The bulk of these records date from the 1980s and 1990s, but there are some publications, correspondence and campaign material that dates from the 1970s and one or two items dating from the 1950s and 1960s. Papers of the national organisation consist of minutes; reports and conference papers; financial records; press statements; circulars; correspondence; campaign material; and publications.

Although the other records provide a valuable, though incomplete, resource to study the organisation, administration, and functions of the Indian Workers Association, it is the correspondence and campaign files, described at MS 2141/A/1/4, and the 'general' files, described at MS 2142/A/1/7 that in some ways can be considered to form the core of the collection, constituting a rich source of information about the Association's activities in providing organised opposition to all forms of racism in Britain, and in international campaigns against oppression and imperialism. Considered together with the other records of the Association, these papers give an indication of the wide-ranging nature of campaigns in which the Indian Workers Association played an active and significant role.

MS 2142/A/1/1 Minutes and related papers, 1981-2003

Incomplete set of records of meetings and conferences held by the Indian Workers Association during the 1980s and 1990s, together with fragmentary records of meetings held in 2002 and 2003, primarily comprising sequences of minutes and agendas of meetings of Central Executive Committee, but also including a small number of minutes of meetings of other committees, including the Secretariat, which seems to have been made up of the office holders of the Central Executive Committee and established as a committee in the early 1990s. The series also includes papers relating to meetings of the Co-ordinating Committee, set up by representatives from both Indian Workers Associations (GB) before the merger of these groups in 1991. These papers contain very few minutes, but do include press releases and a number of circular letters issued by members of the group, and decisions taken on the proposed organisation of the merged Indian Workers Association, together with a report to the merger conference in 1991 which gives an account of joint campaigning activities of the two groups during the late 1980s and early 1990s, and changes that took place within both Indian Workers Associations prior to the merger.

The series also includes records of the proceedings of the National Conference of the Association held in 1993, including copies of the reports of the Central Executive Committee presented by the General Secretary which contain information about the organisation's activities and campaigns, and, like the Co-ordinating Committee report to the merger conference, can be viewed as annual reports of the Indian Workers Association.

MS Co-ordinating Committee papers 2142/A/1/1/4 This file contains material relating to the process by which the Indian Workers Association (GB) which had been led by Jagmohan Joshi and later by Teja Singh Sahota and Avtar Jouhl, and the Indian Workers Association (GB) led by Prem Singh, effected a merger to form one single Indian Workers Association (GB) in 1991. The Association had split into these two sections in 1967, due to ideological differences between different members of the leadership, but had increasingly campaigned together during the late 1970s and 1980s. A Co-ordination Committee, also described in the records as a Co-ordinating Committee, was formed in September 1989, consisting of five representatives from each Indian Workers Association, to steer the merger of policy, campaign activities and local branches.

/1 press release issued by both Indian Workers Associations (GB) and signed by Prem Singh and Teja Singh Sahota announcing their agreement to form a coordination committee, and giving the terms of reference of this body, 23 November 1989

The letter also provides an agenda for this meeting, and lists decisions made by the most recent Central Committee meeting regarding plans for the merger, and other issues

/4 press release and flyers issued by both Indian Workers Associations (GB) following a joint National Conference held 9 June 1990 at West Park College, Smethwick, attended by members, supporters and some fraternal organisations. The press release contains information about resolutions passed at the conference and lists the members of the joint committee formed to steer the central work of the merger.

/5 newspaper cuttings in English from 'The Asian Times' 26 June 1990 and in Punjabi from an unidentified newspaper, reporting on the unity conference held by the two Indian Workers Associations (GB) in Sandwell. The cuttings include photographs taken at the conference.

/6 annotated copy of the Indian Workers Association constitution, with handwritten changes proposed by Harsev Bains and Harpal Brar, members of the joint committee, undated

/7 handwritten notes by Avtar Jouhl in English and Punjabi on the composition of a Central Executive Committee, terms of membership, and the organisation and activities of local branches of the Indian Workers Association. These notes are likely to have been compiled during a meeting or conference held with members of both Indian Workers Associations prior to the merger in 1991

/8 circular letter to all branches sent by Avtar Jouhl on behalf of the Co-ordinating Committee, advising members about the forthcoming National merger conference to be held 16-17 February 1991 in Birmingham, including an agenda for the conference, and a list of tasks for branches. The letter also gives information about a rally to be held in Smethwick 16 January 1991 to be attended by speakers from the trade union movement and by representatives from the African National Congress, Palestinian Liberation Organisation and Sinn Fein

/9 circular letter sent by Avtar Jouhl on behalf of the Co-

ordinating Committee, asking organisations to send fraternal greetings for the Indian Workers Association merger conference. These will be printed in a souvenir issue of 'Lalkar'

There is also a press statement issued by Avtar Jouhl, General Secretary of the Indian Workers Association, on decisions taken at a

meeting of the Willenhall branch committee, 19 July 1990, and a letter from an officer of the Wolverhampton branch to a solicitor in Willenhall relating to his position as trustee of an unidentified project, 13 February 1991

The file also contains various reports, some of which were printed in Punjabi newspapers, by Avtar Jouhl, Prem Singh and others, setting out the case and conditions for a merger of the two Indian Workers Associations

These papers comprise several versions of the Indian Workers Association (GB) Constitution, together with incomplete sequences of circulars, press releases and statements providing information about the policy of the organisation and explaining its stance on political developments both in Britain and in other countries. There are also papers from a seminar organised by the Central Executive Committee in 1995 to discuss the aims and objectives of the organisation in terms of the future direction of campaigning and welfare activities.

Much of this material is concerned with Indian Workers Association campaigns against racism and racist violence against black and Asian people in Britain during and 1980s and 1990s, and against racist immigration legislation introduced by successive Conservative governments led by Margaret Thatcher and John Major during this period. There are also some papers relating to the involvement of the Indian Workers Association in industrial disputes and the trade union movement during this time, statements of support for black liberation struggles in South Africa, for anti-imperialist struggles in India, and statements outlining the position of the organisation on conflicts in Lebanon, Israel/Palestine and Northern Ireland. As well as providing evidence of the Indian Workers Association's position on these issues, through the articles of the Constitution and the statements issued by the organisation, these papers also indicate the active involvement of the Association in tackling situations, through demonstrations, public events and lobbying. Workers Associations (GB) in 1991, and includes the names and addresses of branch presidents and secretaries; and a third list contains the names and contact details of office bearers and members of the Central Executive Committee in around 1995.

The file also includes a list of members of the Women's Section of the Indian Workers Association, probably dating from the mid 1990s, and two sheets of handwritten labels bearing the names and addresses of members of the Central Executive Committee from the c.1995 list.

This series comprises sequences of incoming and outgoing correspondence of the Indian Workers Association, together with material relating to campaigns with which the organisation was involved. This consists of reports; information leaflets and flyers; correspondence; typescript and printed articles; press statements; and press cuttings, and includes material issued by other groups with similar political views to those of the Indian Workers Association, particularly other black and Asian organisations, and white anti-racist groups.

Much of the correspondence and campaign material focuses on the efforts of the Indian Workers Association, often in collaboration with other groups, to oppose racism and racial discrimination in Britain. Dominant themes concern the introduction of immigration legislation by Margaret Thatcher's Conservative government during the 1980s and the threatened deportation of a number of individuals and their families under this legislation. Emphasis is also placed on the issue of Dual Nationality for people of Indian origin who had taken British citizenship as a result of previous immigration legislation and who were now facing difficulties when travelling to India to visit relations. Other papers focus on the Indian Workers Association's support of industrial disputes involving predominantly black and Asian workers during the 1980s, and the issue of racist attacks against members of black and Asian communities in Britain and inadequate police response to these incidents, suggested to be due to institutional racism. There is also material on opposition to the activities of the National Front during the late 1970s and early 1980s, and the British National Party during the early 1990s, and to the revival of fascist political groups in Europe during this period.

Other correspondence and campaign files focus on international campaigns, particularly relating to conflicts in Northern Ireland and Lebanon, and to opposition to perceived US imperialism, seen in the 1991 Gulf war, and the US government's policy on Cuba. There is also substantial material on Indian politics during the 1980s and 1990s, focusing on protests against the repression of political opponents, trade unionists and 'Dalits' or 'untouchables' by Indian governments, and on unrest revolving around the issue of Sikh separatism by militants fighting for the establishment of an independent state of Khalistan. There are also some papers on the international reaction to nuclear tests carried out by India and Pakistan in 1998,

and to the political situation in Kashmir, and tensions between the two countries. Some of this material relates to the effects of political changes in India on people of Indian and Pakistani origin living in Britain.

The Indian Workers Association's involvement with cultural events is also documented here. There is information about tours by the Punjabi dramatist Gursharan Singh that were organised by the Association in 1983 and 1995, and about events to mark the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the Indian Workers Association in 1988 and Vaisakhi in 1999.

The series also contains some general correspondence concerning the administration of the Indian Workers Association. Correspondents include individuals; members of political and campaigning organisations in Britain, India and elsewhere; British Members of Parliament; government officials; and Indian diplomats and politicians.

Taken together, the papers in this series reflect the wide-ranging activities and political impact of the Indian Workers Association during the 1980s and 1990s. The files were kept by Avtar Jouhl, presumably in his role as General Secretary or President of the organisation during this period, and it has been possible to maintain original order to some extent. Files have been arranged within the series to list correspondence first, from MS 2142/A/1/4/1 to MS 2142/A/1/4/3, followed by the campaign files from MS 2142/A/1/4/4 to MS 2142/A/1/4/22. Some campaign files also contain correspondence, and there is some printed material within the correspondence files. There may also be some overlap between files, partly because much general correspondence discusses current campaigning activities. Other correspondence and campaign material is described in the 'general files' described at MS 2142/A/1/7

Indian politics This file consists of correspondence; reports; statements and press releases; flyers; publications; and press cuttings relating to some of the political developments in India between the mid 1970s and the mid 1990s on which the Indian Workers Association took a position, or which affected people of Indian origin living in Britain.

Papers dating from the 1970s are largely associated with Indian Workers Association campaigns against the policies of Indira Gandhi's government during the period, particularly her repression of opposition political parties and the imposition of a State of Emergency between 1975 and 1977. There are also papers on the activities of Naxalite communist groups in India and related peasant and workers organisations, and material on the Indian Workers Association's campaign to oppose atrocities committed against 'Dalits' or 'Untouchables'.

Papers dating from the 1980s also reflect these themes, but focus more on political unrest in Punjab in the period leading up to the assassination of Indira Gandhi in 1984, agitation by Sikh separatists to create an independent Sikh state of Khalistan, and the effects of the unrest on Asian communities in Britain. Some papers also give an indication of the position taken by the Indian Workers Association on this issue.

The file contains fewer papers dating from the 1990s, but these also largely focus on the themes described above.

This section comprises papers relating to some of the local Indian Workers Association branches in England and Scotland that were functioning during the 1980s and 1990s. It also includes a copy of a volume of minutes of meetings of the South Staffordshire branch, based in Wolverhampton, dating from the late 1950s and early 1960s. This was one of the first branches to be re-established in the post-war period.

Material largely consists of correspondence and reports on branch activities, together with some flyers and branch circulars. There are also minutes for meetings of the Birmingham branch, Southall branch, and Wolverhampton branch. Most files also contain lists of branch executive committee members.

The papers of the Birmingham branch are comparatively more extensive, and include some financial records from the 1980s and a typescript article on decolonisation in Congo, dated 1960. These papers are likely to be more substantial because Avtar Jouhl continued to take an active role in branch activities during the 1980s and 1990s although he did not hold office for most of this period.

Branch records described at MS 2141/A/8: Papers of the Indian Workers Association provide evidence for the activities of several local branches during the 1960s and 1970s, including the majority of those represented in this section.

The Birmingham Black Oral History Project aimed to collect, preserve and disseminate the spoken history of Birmingham's black and Asian population through interviewing members of the older generation of these communities, who had migrated to the city during the 1950s and 1960s. Interview questions focused on arrival, working and social life, experiences of racism and reactions to cultural and social differences. Twenty-five people were interviewed for the project between 1990 and 1992, including Avtar Jouhl. The file consists of two incomplete copies of the interview transcripts; the transcript for the contents of cassette ten is missing.

The content of these interviews is as follows:

Avtar Jouhl talks about his childhood in India, giving information about his family, and a description of life in his village in Punjab. Talks about his upbringing, his experiences of Partition in 1947, and the involvement of his cousin in the Indian communist movement.

He discusses his education, the political situation in the late 1940s, his father's death and the effect it had on him, his engagement and marriage, his views on the caste system, social structures in India and discrimination against women.

He describes his reasons for coming to the UK, the process of obtaining a passport, and his arrival in London. He then talks about his arrival in Smethwick, and gives details about the house he lived in when he first arrived, the living conditions there, and his attendance at his first football match, and his first visit to a pub. He also talks about discrimination he experienced in public houses and in barbers shops.

He talks in detail about his working life in foundries in Smethwick and about the beginning of his political involvement in the Indian Workers Association, including brief details about his part in a lobby of Parliament in 1959 against the Immigration Bill of a private member Sir Cyril Osborne, and in other lobbies during the 1960s against immigration legislation.

He talks about how people lived in Smethwick during the 1960s, and about his daily routine and social activities at the time, describing his house moves, reactions to Indian women going out to work, conflicts between first and second generation immigrants, trends towards westernisation amongst children and young people during the 1970s, social hierarchies amongst Sikhs, the arrival of Kenyan Asians in the late 1960s, the development of businesses run by Punjabis in the UK, and the rising standard of living of immigrants.

He gives details about the organisation of the Indian Workers Association and its political leanings, talks about the beginnings of the Association in the late 1930s, and then its revival in the 1950s, mentions the welfare work the Indian Workers Association began to do in helping people with passport and visa issues, completing income tax and social security forms, helping people who were having problems with housing and education, campaigns in factories to combat racial discrimination and links with trade union movement.

He goes on to talk about Indian Workers Association political campaigns, particularly their involvement in the 1964 election campaign in Smethwick against the actions of Peter Griffiths, the Conservative candidate, who was hostile towards immigrant communities in the area. He mentions the death of the general secretary of the Indian Workers Association, Jagmohan Joshi, on a campaign rally in 1979, and speaks in depth about industrial disputes which the Indian Workers Association was involved with during the 1970s, and his role as shop steward at the foundry he worked at. He also mentions Indian Workers Association involvement in the miners strike.

He speaks about the general political situation, nationally and internationally, in 1991, and the position of the Indian Workers Association at that time. He reflects on his own identity, and looks back on his life and the experience of migration.

He discusses Indian Workers Association involvement with

various groups campaigning against racism, and promoting equality and social justice in the 1960s and 1970s. He also speaks in detail about Indian politics.

He mentions work that the Indian Workers Association did with Charles Parker and Banner Theatre during the 1970s, which formed part of the cultural activities that the Indian Workers Association organised. He refers to being interviewed by Charles Parker for the 'Great Divide' project

MS 2142/B Records of the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Centre, 1978-2003 Administrative History

The Indian Workers Association had been involved in community and welfare work since its establishment, and provided assistance to all members of the Indian community, playing a role as advisor and mediator to people in finding employment, complying with immigration regulations, completing tax forms, lodging claims for family allowance and other benefits, securing accommodation and mortgages, and getting legal representation. By the late 1970s, the Association was dealing with a number of social and welfare issues arising from the arrival in Britain of Indian migrants wives and families, and the different needs of younger Indians who had grown up in Britain. These issues included the problems of youth unemployment; the need for English language tuition; the provision of childcare and playgroup facilities; and the growing need for the provision of a conciliation service for family disputes and cases in which adult children became estranged from their parents.

In order to continue to fulfil a social and welfare role in the community, the Indian Workers Association wanted to purchase premises to use as a permanent welfare centre which would provide social and cultural facilities as well as a point of contact for people seeking advice and support. It was intended that this welfare centre would be run by an organiser or warden, with assistance from part-time paid and voluntary workers. The Association identified a property at 346 Soho Road in the Handsworth area of Birmingham, and applied to the Barrow and Geraldine S. Cadbury Trust for financial assistance in the purchase of this property in 1977. In order to receive funding from charitable trusts, the Association set up the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust to oversee the running of the welfare centre, to be called the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Centre, and to administer its accounts. A constitution was drawn up, and the trust was managed by a committee elected annually, consisting of six members and Honorary Officers; President, Treasurer and Secretary. The centre opened in May 1978. It was partially destroyed by fire in January 1991, and was rebuilt with the help of grants from the Cadbury Trust during the early 1990s.

The trust was funded by grants from the Cadbury Trust and the Urban Aid Programme; by subscriptions and donations from members of the trust; and by fund raising events organised by the Indian Workers Association.

Although the main function of the welfare centre was to provide advisory and welfare services, the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust also staged cultural awareness events, and campaigned with the Indian Workers Association for the release of government papers relating to Udham Singh from 1989 until the papers were finally opened in 1996 and 1997. The welfare trust was then involved in the publication of an edition of these documents, and of a book on the life of Udham Singh written by Navtej Singh of Punjabi University, Patiala in India.

The co-ordinator of the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust was Surinder Kumar Taggar until his death in 2002. The welfare centre celebrated its Silver Jubilee in August 2003.

Correspondence; reports; grant application forms; financial records; case work papers; and associated material relating to the work of the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Centre. The majority of the material dates from the 1980s and 1990s, but there are a small number of papers with a later date. There is also a substantial amount of material relating to the Udham Singh research project, set up by the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust and Punjabi University in Patiala, India. The Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust and the Indian Workers Association campaigned for the release of several government files relating to the arrest and trial of Udham Singh following his assassination of Sir Michael O' Dwyer in 1940, and worked with Punjabi University to produce a biography and a volume of original documents relating to Udham Singh's life. Copies of the government files are included in this section. See MS 2141/B for other records of the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Centre

The majority of the material dates from the late 1980s and early to mid 1990s, but there are some papers with earlier or later dates.

These papers chiefly concern applications by individuals to live and work in Britain and appeals against the refusal of entry certificates or indefinite leave to remain in Britain, under the terms of British immigration legislation, but there are also applications for passports, and for various social security benefits, particularly for disability living allowance payments. The series also contains papers of a more miscellaneous nature, relating to other welfare work and projects carried out by the Indian Workers Association

This series largely comprises photocopies of British government files on Udham Singh, consisting of the Metropolitan Police file produced following his arrest for the murder of Sir Michael O'Dwyer in March 1940; the Home Office file containing information about Udham Singh's detention in prison, the appeal against his sentence of execution for the murder, and his treatment and behaviour in prison; the Prison Commission file which contains further information about Udham Singh's experiences in prison, and the process leading to his execution in July 1940; and papers from the Public and Judicial Department of the India Office, containing information relating to Udham Singh and his activities from the early 1930s until his death in 1940.

These papers were released in 1997 and 1998 following a long-running campaign by the Indian Workers Association and the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust, and the series also contains correspondence and associated material relating to this campaign, and references to research carried out on Udham Singh's life using the government files, including a book published by Punjabi University, Patiala entitled 'Challenge to Imperial Hegemony: The Life

Story of a Great Indian Patriot Udham Singh', by Navtej Singh in 1998, the making of a film, and other cultural events celebrating Udham Singh's life.

Copies of 'Challenge to Imperial Hegemony' and an edited volume of the government files on Udham Singh, published in 2002, are included in this section.

Udham Singh is considered to be a particularly important figure by the Indian Workers Association because he is believed to have been one of the founder members of the Association at its formation in 1938. There are several references elsewhere in the collection to cultural events marking his death, seen as a martyrdom by members of the Indian Workers Association.

MS 2142/C Papers relating to Trade Union activities, 1969-1999

This section of the archive documents Avtar Jouhl's career in the trade union movement, from the early 1970s to the 1990s. Although he had become a trade union member since the late 1950s, the earliest material relating to his trade union role dates from the early 1970s. This comprises substantial records generated in the course of his work as Transport and General Workers Union [TGWU] shop steward and safety representative at Birmid Qualcast foundries in Smethwick, consisting of minutes; correspondence between trade union officials and company management; and a wealth of related material focusing on wage agreements; health and safety at work; and some of the industrial disputes that took place in the West Midlands area between the early 1970s and early 1990s.

The remainder of the records document Avtar Jouhl's later trade union movement career as lecturer in Trade Union Studies at Hall Green Technical College, between 1987 and the mid 1990s. He continued to be an active member of the Transport and General Workers Union [TGWU] but also became involved in NATFHE, the University and College Lecturers Union. He was particularly committed to supporting black and Asian trade union members and became a member of the TUC Race Relations Committee and took part in a number of Black Workers Conferences during the 1990s. This interest is also reflected in the educational material in this section which includes conference and training course papers and has a strong focus on efforts within the trade union education movement to tackle racism. Avtar Jouhl ran courses for black and Asian workers and convened or spoke at conferences on race relations and social justice, and campaigned against racial and sexual discrimination both within and outside the trade union movement. The section includes a large number of trade union related publications, many of which were issued by the TUC Education Service. These publications cover a variety of topics, but many focus on anti-racism and health and safety issues. Others are concerned with the Single European Act 1992 and its implications for trade union members, particularly those from black and Asian communities. This concern is documented in other papers relating to conferences and training courses on the European Union. Organisational papers of some trade union committees and other trade union-linked bodies that Avtar Jouhl was a member of or advised are also included in this section.

MS 2142/C/1 Industrial relations and disputes, 1970-1994

This section primarily consists of papers relating to Avtar Jouhl's work as Transport and General Workers Union [TGWU] shop steward and safety representative at Birmid Qualcast foundries in Smethwick during the 1970s and 1980s, but also includes papers relating to industrial disputes, some of which took place during the early 1990s.

Papers include minutes for shop stewards meetings, both with and without company managers, and minutes of safety committee meetings and other sub-committees. There are also copies of agreements between trade union representatives and company management; internal memoranda; reports; company statements on wages and benefits issues; correspondence; and copies of government regulations on Health and Safety at work. The section also includes a sequence of notebooks kept by Avtar Jouhl during the 1970s and early 1980s in which he recorded minutes of meetings he attended, and made notes on various issues he was called on to deal with as a shop steward.

The papers on industrial disputes largely focus on those with which Avtar Jouhl was involved as a Transport and General Workers Union [TGWU] representative, including the strike at Imperial Typewriters in Leicester he took part in the regional inquiry, but include papers relating to the Burnsall strike in which Jouhl's involvement was apparently as a NATFHE member. There is some overlap between files on industrial disputes in this section and those on similar topics in section A; the difference is that material in files in this section are generated mainly from the perspective of Avtar Jouhl's trade union role rather than his role in the Indian Workers Association

It employed advice workers, Asian language workers and an administrator, and was also staffed by a team of volunteers.

West Midlands Low Pay Unit

The Low Pay Unit was an independent campaign and research organisation established in 1974. It aimed to bring the issue of low pay to the attention of policy makers, trade unionists, politicians, advice and community organisations, and the general public. It supported the introduction of a minimum wage. The West Midlands Low Pay Unit was set up in August 1983 by West Midlands County Council and the Low Pay Unit in response to the economic decline experienced in the West Midlands. It aimed to investigate the causes, extent and effects of low pay within the region and to publicise its findings, focusing particular attention on groups suffering disadvantage and discrimination. The Unit carried out advisory and campaigning work in addition to its research. Low Pay Units provide advice and research on issues concerned with employment. They are independent membership organisations, which seeks to promote improvements in pay and condition of employment. The Low Pay Unit was replaced by the Low Pay Commission as a result of the National Minimum Wage Act 1998 to advise the Government about the National Minimum Wage.

This section of the archive primarily comprises organisational records of a number of campaigning groups and political parties active in Britain, India and Canada, most of which the

Indian Workers Association co-operated with on specific campaigns, or which individual members were involved with in as committee members or office holders. Papers consist of reports; correspondence; minutes and agendas; press statements; circulars; leaflets and flyers; articles; newsletters; magazines and pamphlets.

The organisations the Indian Workers Association was most closely associated with were the Association of Indian Communists, in which many office holders in the Indian Workers Association took a prominent role, and the Campaign Against Racist Laws, in which members from both Indian Workers Associations (GB) held official positions. Some members also joined the Socialist Labour Party in the later 1990s, and stood for election for this party. Avtar Jouhl was a member of the Management Committee of both the Immigration Aid Unit and the Sandwell Community Law Centre, both of which offered legal advice and support to people in Birmingham and Sandwell on immigration, nationality and other issues. He was also a member of the Barrow Cadbury Fund Employment Panel.

The section also contains papers of organisations not directly associated with the Indian Workers Association including several black and Asian campaign and welfare groups, as well as various publications likely to have been collected by members of the Indian Workers Association, including a substantial number produced by Chinese and Indian Communist groups. It is possible that the Association collaborated with some of the campaign and welfare groups on campaigns, or that their contact was in an advisory capacity.

MS 2142/D/1 Anti Nazi League

The Anti-Nazi League was formed in 1977 in response to the increased activities of and growth in support for the National Front. It is likely to have been established by Paul Holborrow, a district organiser of the Socialist Workers Party, Ernie Roberts, a trade unionist and later Labour MP, and Peter Hain, an anti-apartheid activist and also later Labour MP, following a confrontation at which anti-fascist groups attempted to stop a National Front demonstration in Lewisham in August 1977. The League enjoyed broad support from other left-wing groups, and trade unions, and the founding statement was signed by several hundred trade unionists and community activists, as well as footballers, musicians and other celebrities. Many local Anti-Nazi League groups were set up.

The Anti-Nazi League worked together with a sister organisation, Rock Against Racism, which brought together white punk groups and black reggae bands to unite people through music and combat the threat of racism and fascism. The largest Anti-Nazi League/Rock Against Racism events were large carnivals organised from 1978, publicised in the music press as well as through left-wing networks. Local carnivals were also held.

The Anti-Nazi League was very active between 1977 and 1979 in organising anti-fascist demonstrations, including a protest march against racism in Brick Lane on 14 May

1978, following the racist murder of Altab Ali, a protest against a National Front demonstration at Southall on 23 April 1979. Here the police Special Patrol Group attacked Anti-Nazi League demonstrators, and Blair Peach, a teacher and member of the Anti-Nazi League, was killed.

Between 1977 and 1979, several million Anti-Nazi League leaflets were distributed, and thousands of badges sold. Fifty local Labour Parties affiliated, along with many branches of several trade unions. The campaigning of the Anti-Nazi League forced the National Front onto the defensive, preventing activists from putting their message across and from demonstrating. The National Front did badly in the 1979 General Election, and split into three rival factions, and support on the streets crumbled.

Following the election, there seemed to be less need for an anti-fascist movement, and many Anti-Nazi League and Rock Against Racism campaigners took up different causes, including Right to Work marches, and Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament campaigns. The last Rock Against Racism Carnival took place in Leeds in 1981, while the Anti-Nazi League was officially wound down in autumn and winter 1981.

The Anti-Nazi League was relaunched in 1992 by the original founder members of the organisation, at a time when the British National Party were attempting to gain political influence, and fascist groups in France, Eastern Europe and Germany were gaining votes. The Anti-Nazi League became Unite Against Fascism in 2004, with the aim of alerting British society to the rising threat of the extreme right, in particular the British National Party (BNP), gaining an electoral foothold in this country. A connected campaign, Love Music Hate Racism, was formed in 2002, in the tradition of Rock Against Racism. This group uses the music scene to celebrate diversity and involve people in anti-racist and anti-fascist activity, as well as to urge people to vote against fascist candidates in elections.

MS 2142/D/2 Association of Indian Communists, 1967-1999

The Association of Indian Communists was formed in around 1966 by Indian members of the Communist Party of Great Britain, many of whom were also Indian Workers Association members or office holders. According to research by De Witt John, Indian members of the Communist Party of Great Britain formed their own branches, and elected their own officers. English party officials may also have attended these meetings, but they were largely conducted in Punjabi. Although these Indian branches of the Communist Party of Great Britain took part in some of the campaigns led by the organisation, they were also very active in organising Indian migrants on the basis of class interests, and as such, had close links with local Indian Workers Associations. De Witt John suggests that Indian communists became active in many local Indian Workers Association branches, and were also instrumental in founding new branches during the 1960s. This may partly explain why the same people feature in the leadership of the national Indian Workers Association and of the Association of Indian Communists during this period.

The Association appears to have been organised on similar lines to those of the Indian Workers Association, with a Central Executive Committee and branch committees elected annually, and meeting taking place on a regular basis. National Conferences were also held, and the decisions of the Central Executive Committee disseminated to members through circular letters and notices to branches in the same way that the agendas and minutes of meetings were. The Association seems to have supported Indian Workers Association campaigns, and its journal 'Lalkar', launched in 1967, was read by members of the Indian Workers Association; indeed, many members of the editorial board also held office in the Indian Workers Association, and were later involved in the establishment of the Indian Workers Association magazine 'Lalkar' in 1979.

The Association of Indian Communists and the Association of Communist Workers took the decision to disband in 1996 and merge into a single organisation called the Association of Communists GB

The Association of Communists GB was established in 1997 following the merger of the Association of Indian Communists and the Association of Communist Workers. Many members of the Association of Indian Communists presumably joined this organisation, but evidence in these papers suggests that Avtar Jouhl, and perhaps others, later left the group due to ideological differences.

through armed rebellion. The Desh Bhagat Yadgar committee worked to establish the Desh Bhagat Yadgar Memorial Hall in Jalandhar, India, a museum and monument to preserve the history of Gadar Party, Gadarites and the freedom movement

This file consists primarily of correspondence between Avtar Jouhl for the Indian Workers Association and members of the Desh Bhagat Yadgar Committee, particularly Gandharav Sen, concerning donations by Indian Workers Association members and workers at Darcast Component Foundry, Smethwick, towards the cost of building an auditorium hall in Jalandhar, built as a memorial to members of the Ghadr party. Letters include some information about the construction process and a Langar and Mela held in June 1998 attended by representatives of the Communist Party of India and other groups.

Some correspondence also discusses other matters, including the release of government papers on Udham Singh, the collaboration of the Indian Workers Association with Punjabi University in Patiala on a biography of Udham Singh, and the re-publication of the Ghadr Directory of 1934. One letter from Gandharav Sen to Avtar Jouhl at the Shaheed Udham Singh Welfare Trust expresses thanks for copies of the Udham Singh papers which will be maintained in the Desh Bhagat Yadgar library. people with immigration or nationality problems, and offered advice and support on the relevant legislation. Handsworth Law Centre set up a committee to seek funding for an Immigration Aid Unit in 1980, and after grants were received from the Barrow Cadbury Fund, the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust and the British Council of Churches the Unit was constituted in February 1981. The Management Committee was made up of representatives from local organisations and agencies with an involvement in immigration and nationality issues. Tony Hug of the Bangladeshi Workers Association was the first chairperson of the Immigration Aid Unit, and the first resource workers were Dean Huggins, Mohan Lal, and Geoff Wilkins, who had been involved in fund-raising for the project, and worked at the unit from 1981 to 1984. The Unit rented an office at Saltley Action Centre and with the help of further funding, from West Midlands County Council, was able to employ three resource workers by 1982. Unit workers addressed meetings, gave talks to groups and assisted with producing publications in English and South Asian languages. The Unit was also involved with anti-deportation campaigns and lobbied the Home Office on issues relating to immigration legislation.

It was founded in September 1967 following a meeting of representatives of a number of ethnic minority and civil rights organisations in Southall. Vishnu Sharma, co-founder, and leader of the Indian Workers Association (Southall), served as the first General Secretary. He worked with JCWI for ten years and remained closely associated with it until his death in 1992. JCWI does not receive government funding, but is entirely dependent on donations plus grants from charities and other trusts and affiliation fees. This helps to preserve its independence and the confidence of the communities it serves. JCWI undertakes casework and campaigning. It intervenes when people are detained or imprisoned at points of entry into Britain. JCWI provides representation for clients at hearings of the Immigration Appeal tribunals and offers advice to anyone with immigration problems. It makes no charge for any of these services. Involvement in mass lobbies and demonstrations defending the rights of immigrants is another facet of its work. When and where necessary, JCWI works to expose government practices and policies, campaigning for change. It monitors the effects of government changes, often working with other bodies, and challenging the Home Office as the need arises.

MS 2142/D/14 Socialist Labour Party

The Socialist Labour Party was formed in 1996 by former trade union leader Arthur Scargill, following Tony Blair's repositioning of the British Labour Party and the abandonment of Clause Four. The party advocates traditionally Socialist policies, such as state ownership of industry and high taxation to fund public services and initially attracted well known trade union figures such as Mick Rix and Bob Crow. It was also entered by revolutionary Communist groups who were later expelled from the party. The party has contested general elections in some constituencies but has not received a significant share of the vote.

There have been a number of internal conflicts between members, particularly those seeking to develop a rigid Marxist-Leninist party and those committed to Scargill's original vision of a more leftist Labour Party. These disputes culminated in the expulsion of a group around Harpal Brar who then formed the Communist Party of Great Britain (Marxist-Leninist).
